Guidance for Pharmacy Partners Outside of North Dakota

ONE Program was created in 2018 by faculty from the North Dakota State University School of Pharmacy to utilize community pharmacists in addressing the opioid epidemic.

Can pharmacists who are not licensed in North Dakota take the ONE Program training for credit?

Yes, any licensed pharmacist can take the ONE Program training for credit.
